
After 25 years at the helm of Squeeze, Tilbrook hardly needs any introduction. He will be at the Jazz Café following the release of his second solo album, Transatlantic Ping Pong. The Dirty Pretty Things were reviewed favourably in this col-

umn two weeks ago at the Camden Crawl. They are known to most as the new band of the other half of The Libertines, Carl Barat, and they re already sold out two nights at the Forum, so tickets for the remaining gig on Monday will not take long to go. But fear not, for tonight (Friday May 19) there is much fun to be had at the Kentish Town venue in the shape of Mr. Scruff

of Mr Scruff. Expect a humorous night of dance music tinged with the sounds of brass and jazz.

The oddest gig to grab attention this week, however, has to be Deva Premal and Miten. Legend has it they can count among their fans Cher and the Dalai Lama, although it is debat-able whether this unlikely pair will be rubbing shoulders with other punters at the Shaw Theatre

on Saturday June 10.



German-born Deva Premal and London-born Miten (born Andy Desmond - who was once a singer-songwriter under this
